Decisions, Decisions . . . Our Sewing Bee Room



A century ago, the Masons and Eastern Stars in Lakewood were busy making plans for the building we now call home. By the summer of 1914 the design process was fully underway, and the Board was circulating floor plan drawings for comment.

There was no doubt that the new structure would contain a Lodge Room and a Banquet Room, as these were and are essential elements of any Masonic Temple. We infer that our Ballroom was likely the subject of many discussions inasmuch as the minutes of our Lakewood Masonic Temple Company's incorporators' first meeting in 1912 stated that the new building would contain "suitable Lodge, club and reception rooms therein, . . . renting or disposing of all or any part of the same not used for Masonic purposes." A Ballroom in a suburban or small town Masonic Temple is a rarity, so one imagines the Board must have required the proponents to make a good business case for its inclusion.

Our Sewing Bee Room (see the photo to the left) has an interesting history of its own. On May 29, 1914, the Board of Directors received the following communication:

"Gentlemen: The committee of Lincoln Chapter, No. 309, O.E.S., appointed by your Honorable Board to inspect the plans of the Lakewood Masonic Temple, beg leave to suggest the following:

"That the room on the basement floor now designated as a "Woman's Club room", be arranged for a serving room to be used in conjunction with the kitchen.

"We believe that such a serving room is absolutely needed and that a sink and cupboards be provided in it, in addition to the sink and cupboards in the kitchen. A toilet should be provided on this floor for the use of hired help, as such help will frequently be necessary. [Editor's note: Lincoln Chapter served 1,128 dinners during the early 1914 capital campaign which raised over \$59,000 (nearly \$1.4 million in current dollars) in capital stock subscriptions.]

"That a room in the mezzanine floor (Detroit Ave. side), be arranged for the use of the women as a Club room or sewing room.

"That a closet be provided in the passageway as close to the preparation room as possible for the use of the Eastern Star for the storage of robes, pedestals and paraphernalia.

"We beg leave to thank the Board for its courtesy in giving us the opportunity to inspect the plans (continued on page 10)

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Including Our Foundation in an Estate Plan

While there are various ways to bequeath gifts to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation through your will, each with varying tax consequences, the simplest approach is an outright bequest. The wording can be as simple as:

"I, [name], of [city, state, ZIP], give, devise and bequeath to the Lakewood Masonic Foundation [written amount or percentage of the estate or description of property] for its unrestricted use and purpose."

You may, of course, choose to name either our Temple Company or our Endowment Fund instead of or in addition to our Foundation. In such cases you should specify the "Lakewood Masonic Temple Company" and/or the "Lakewood Masonic Temple Endowment Fund."

Your bequest to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation will enable us to carry on our important work of historic preservation, charity and education. Other than printing, mailing and very minor administrative expenses, all Foundation monies are used to support our underlying purposes.

Gifts and bequests to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation are exempt for federal income and estate tax purposes to the extent permitted by law. However, gifts and bequests to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Company or our Lakewood Masonic Temple Endowment Fund are *not* tax-deductible. Depending on your situation, the different tax treatments may or may not make a difference to you. As always, we encourage you to consult with your attorney and/or tax advisor before making any major gift.

Franklin, Benjamin

This sage and patriot was born in the city of Boston, Massachusetts, on the 6th of January, 1706. Of the time and place of his initiation as a Freemason we have no positive evidence; it was, however, certainly anterior to the year 1734, and he was probably made a Mason in England during a temporary visit which he paid to that country. On the 24th of June, 1734, a petition was signed by himself and several brethren residing at Philadelphia, and presented to the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, praying for a Constitution to hold a Lodge in that city. The prayer of the petition was granted, and Franklin was appointed the first Master. "He was," says C. W. Moore, "probably invested with special powers, for we find that in November following he affixes to his name the title of 'Grand Master of Pennsylvania'." In November, 1734, Franklin applied to Henry Price, who had received from England authority to establish Masonry in this country, for a confirmation of those powers conferred by the first deputation or warrant. It is probable that the request was granted although I can find no record of the fact. In 1734, Franklin edited an edition of Anderson's Constitutions, which was probably the first Masonic work published in America.

While Franklin was in France as the American Ambassador from this country, he appears to have taken much interest in Masonry. He affiliated with the celebrated Lodge of the Nine Sisters, of which Lalande, Court de Gebelin, and other celebrities of French literature, were members. He took a prominent part in the initiation of Voltaire, and on his death acted as Senior Warden of the Lodge of Sorrow held in his memory. The Lodge of Nine Sisters held Franklin in such esteem that it struck a medal in his honor, of which a copy, supposed to be the only one now in existence, belongs to the Provincial Grand Lodge of Mecklenburg.



High Priest's Message

Companions:

What can I say, after a successful year, with the support of all of you, we move forward. This year we had a very excellent Inspection conferring the Most Excellent Master Degree, with favorable comments received from both our Inspecting Officer Right Excellent Companion Robert Berteau and our Most Excellent Grand High Priest Robert W. Thomas. They both noted the tremendous progress our Chapter has made over the past year with many new members and new officers. We know that this new Capitular year will be even better.

Congratulations to our new officers. Companions Vinny Salls, Sean Benjamin and Bob Niebaum will serve as Excellent High Priest, King and Scribe, respectively. Highest of Hills

In the Old York Lectures was the following passage: "Before we had the convenience of such well-formed Lodges, the Brethren used to meet on the highest of hills and in the lowest of valleys. And if they were asked why they met so high, so low, and so very secret, they replied-the better to see and observe all that might ascend or descend; and in case a cowan should appear, the Tiler might give timely notice to the Worshipful Master, by which means the Lodge might be closed, the jewels put by, thereby preventing any unlawful intrusion." Commenting on this, Dr. Oliver says, "Among other observances which were common to both the true and spurious Freemasonry, we find the practices of performing commemorative rites on the highest of hills and in the lowest of valleys. This practice was in high esteem among all the inhabitants of the ancient world, from a fixed persuasion that the summit of mountains made a nearer approach to the celestial deities, and the valleys or holy cavern to the infernal and submarine gods than the level country; and that, therefore, the prayers of mortals were more likely to be heard in such situations." Hutchinson also says: "The highest hills and the lowest valleys were from the earliest times esteemed sacred, and it was supposed that the Spirit of God was peculiarly diffusive in those places." The sentiment was expressed in the language of the earliest lectures of the eighteenth century, and is still retained, without change of words, in the lectures of the present day. But introduced, at first, undoubtedly with special reference to the ancient worship on "high places," and the celebration of the mysteries in the caverns of initiation, it is now retained for the purpose of giving warning and instruction as to the necessity of security and secrecy in the performance of our mystical rites, and this is the reason assigned in the modern lectures. And, indeed, the notion of thus

expressing the necessity of secrecy seems to have been early adopted, while that of the sacredness of these places was beginning to be lost sight of; for in a lecture of the middle of the last century, or perhaps earlier, it was said that "the Lodge stands upon holy ground, or the highest hill or lowest vale, or in the Vale of Jehosophat, or any *other secret place*." The sacredness of the spot is, it is true, here adverted to, but there is an emphasis given to its secrecy.

Lily

The plant so frequently mentioned in the Old Testament under the name of lily, as an emblem of purity and peace, was the lotus lily of Egypt and India. It occupied a conspicuous place among the ornaments of the Temple furniture. The brim of the molten sea was wrought with flowers of the lotus; the chapiters on the tops of the pillars at the porch, and the tops of the pillars themselves, were adorned with the same plant. Sir Robert Ker Porter, describing a piece of sculpture which he found at Persepolis, says, "Almost every one in this procession holds in his hand a figure like the lotus. This flower was full of meaning among the ancients, and occurs all over the East. Egypt, Persia, Palestine, and India present it everywhere over their architecture, in the hands and on the heads of their sculptured figures, whether in statue or in bass-relief. We also find it in the sacred vestments and architecture of the tabernacle and Temple of the Israelites. The lily which is mentioned by our Saviour, as an image of peculiar beauty and glory, when comparing the works of nature with the decorations of art, was a different flower; probably a species of liliun. This is also represented in all pictures of the salutation of Gabriel to the Virgin Mary; and, in fact, has been held in mysterious veneration by people of all nations and times. "It is the symbol of divinity; of purity, and abundance, and of a love most complete in perfection, charity, and benediction; as in Holy Scripture, that mirror of purity, Susanna is defined Susa, which signified the lily flower, and chief city of the Persians, bearing that name for excellency. Hence, the lily's three leaves in the arms of France meaneth Piety, Justice, and Charity. So far, the general impression of a peculiar regard to this beautiful and fragrant flower; but the early Persians attached to it a peculiar sanctity." We must not, however, forget the difference between the lotus of the Old Testament and the lily of the New. The former is a Masonic plant



The Sewing Bee Room was indeed built on the First Mezzanine level on the Detroit Avenue end (the front) of the building, equipped with its own rest room and a very spacious storage room. Closet space for Eastern Star paraphernalia was provided on the Lodge Room floor close to the Preparation Room.

The space adjacent to the Kitchen was equipped as a serving room. Some decades later it was outfitted with an automatic dishwasher, so it is now more often referred to as the Dishwashing Room. A small rest room was built to the rear of the serving (dishwashing) room, just inside the rear Kitchen outside door to what is now our parking lot. Astute visitors to our Banquet Room and Kitchen might think it odd that there is a night light over the Kitchen serving window that opens into the Banquet Room and that the light switches in the Kitchen are at the wrong end of the room, adjacent to the serving window rather than at the Kitchen entrance. These details are an artifact of the original Kitchen layout in which there were double doors from the Banquet Room into the Kitchen itself. In a later remodeling these doors were replaced by the present serving window. The night light above the serving window was originally an exit sign.
