

Grand Master Lays Centennial Cornerstone May 30



One hundred years ago, in the spring of 1915, the hopes and dreams of our Lakewood Masonic Family became reality. Sufficient funds had been raised to begin construction of our now historic fraternal home. On April 3, 1915, ground was broken. The cornerstone was laid in front of a large crowd on June 26, 1915, by Edwin S. Griffiths, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons of Ohio. One can only imagine the excitement and enthusiasm that prevailed among our members and, no doubt, the Lakewood community.

A century later we have our own opportunity to demonstrate our own excitement and enthusiasm. M. W. Brother Steven E. Cokonougher, Grand Master of Masons in Ohio, and the Grand Lodge Officers, will lay a Centennial Cornerstone on Saturday morning, May 30, 2015, assisted by members of our

Lakewood Masonic Family.

Weather permitting, beginning at 9:00a we plan to process from our original home at the northwest corner of Detroit Avenue and Warren Road [then the Lakewood Market, where we met on the second floor; now First Federal of Lakewood] three blocks west to our Lakewood Masonic Temple. The ceremony is open to guests such as family and friends as well as the general public. This is an occasion you won't want to miss!

As we begin our Centennial celebrations of our important century-old milestones, please consider making a special gift to honor the foresight and hard work of our forbearers who conceived our fraternal home, developed the plans, raised the necessary funds and brought their dreams to fruition. Making an Honor Gift

From time to time as we pass life's milestones we are mindful of our friends and loved ones who have done so much to enrich our lives. It naturally comes to mind that we would like to give each some special gift as a token of our relationship. But what to give, especially to the person who seems to have everything?

Our Lakewood Masonic Foundation provides an easy alternative for you. Consider making "honor gifts" to friends or loved ones who hold a special cause close to their hearts. For Masons and Eastern Star members, that cause may well be our Lakewood Masonic Family. You may wish to honor our Centennial.

What is an "honor gift?" It is simply a donation that you make in recognition of someone significant in your life. Honor gifts are often made on traditional occasions but can be made at any time in recognition of a significant achievement or milestone or as a method of saying "congratulations" or "thank you."

The procedure for making an "honor gift" to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation is straightforward. Our donation forms, such as the one on page 11, and our pre-printed donation envelopes have an "Honor" box to check and a space in which to write the name of the person to be honored. In addition to the tax receipt letter that we send you, we will send a letter to each person you honor advising that you have made a gift in his/her name.

As with other gifts, you may designate your donation to be used for our historic preservation, educational or charitable purposes; split your gift among these purposes; or simply ask that it be devoted to our greatest need.

And, as with other gifts, you have a number of options for making your donation, such as by check, stocks or bonds (valued at current fair market value), a life insurance policy that you may no longer need, or a charitable gift annuity or remainder trust.

Your gifts can be directed to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation, to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Endowment Fund or to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Company Operating Fund. Gifts and bequests to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation are deductible for federal income and estate taxes to the extent permitted by law. Gifts to our Endowment and Operating Funds are not deductible. As always, we encourage you to consult your legal and financial advisors for assistance in determining in what form and in what amount you should make your gift or bequest.

As we begin to celebrate our Centennial, we are stretching our resources more than ever; and your gift to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation means more than ever before. We still have pressing needs if we are to catch up on deferred maintenance. Windows must be repaired or replaced, plumbing and electrical systems must be updated, and decorations must be refreshed. We have made significant progress, but there is more to do. Worthy charitable and educational endeavors also need our support. Don't delay; make your gift today. Make it in honor of our Centennial.

Corner-Stone, Symbolism of the.

The corner-stone is the stone which lies at the corner of two walls, and forms the corner of the foundation of an edifice. In Masonic buildings it is now always placed in the northeast; but this rule was not always formerly observed. As the foundation on which the entire structure is supposed to rest, it is considered by Operative Masons as the most important stone in the edifice. It is laid with impressive ceremonies; the assistance of Speculative Masons is often, and ought always to be invited to give dignity to the occasion; and for this purpose Freemasonry has provided an especial ritual (continued on page 4)

which is to govern the proper performance of that duty.

Among the ancients the cornerstone of important edifices was laid with impressive ceremonies. These are well described by Tacitus in the history of the rebuilding of the capitol. After detailing the preliminary ceremonies, which consisted in a procession of vestals, who with chaplets of flowers encompassed the ground and consecrated it by libations of living water, he (continued on page 5)

adds that, after solemn prayer, Helvidius, to whom the care of rebuilding the Capitol had been committed, "laid his hand upon the fillets that adorned the foundation stone, and also the cords by which it was to be drawn to its place. In that instance the magistrates, the priests, the senators, the Roman knights, and a number of citizens, all acting with one effort and general demonstrations of joy, laid hold of the ropes and dragged the ponderous load to its destined spot. They then threw in ingots of gold and silver, and other metals which had never been melted in the furnace, but still retained, untouched by human art, their first formation in the bowels of the earth."

In addition, we support the RTS program at MetroHealth Medical Center by supplying clothing, blankets, small toys, memory boxes and silk flowers for deceased neonates and stillborn babies so that the families can hold the baby and have pictures taken to remember their child. A third charity is collecting soda can tabs to donate to Al Koran Shrine to support their transportation for patients to the crippled children's hospital. There is a container in the dining room to place tabs if anyone would like to contribute to the cause.

We support our Masonic Youth Organizations and have a yearly Children's Day when we have young people as guests at an activity to introduce them to our adult organization. This year that will be our annual picnic during the summer. The exact date, time, and place are to be announced.

Those eligible to petition for membership are wives, widows, mothers, sisters, daughters, and granddaughters of Sir Knights or S.O.O.B. members.

The symbolism of the corner-stone when duly laid with Masonic rites is full of significance, which refers to its form, to its situation, to its permanence, and to its consecration.

As to its form, it must be perfectly square on its surfaces, and in its solid contents a cube. Now the square is a symbol of morality, and the cube of truth. In its situation it lies between the north, the place of darkness, and the east, the place of light; and hence this position symbolizes the Masonic progress from darkness to light, and from ignorance to knowledge. The permanence and durability of the corner-stone, which lasts long after the building in whose foundation it was placed has fallen into decay, is intended to remind the Mason that, when this earthly house of his tabernacle shall have passed away, he has within him a sure foundation of eternal life—a corner-stone of immortality—an emanation from that Divine Spirit which pervades all nature, and which, therefore, must survive the tomb, and rise, triumphant and eternal, above the decaying dust of death and the grave.

The stone, when deposited in its appropriate place, is carefully examined with the necessary implements of Operative Masonry,—the square, the level, and the plumb, themselves all symbolic in meaning,—and is then

declared to be "well formed, true, and trusty." Thus the Mason is taught that his virtues are to be tested by temptation and trial, by suffering and adversity, before they can be pronounced by the Master Builder of souls to be materials worthy of the spiritual building of eternal life, fitted, "as living stones, for that hoiuse not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

And lastly, in the ceremony of depositing the corner-stone, the elements of Masonic consecration are produced, and the stone is solemnly set apart by pouring corn, wine, and oil upon its surface, emblematic of the Nourishment, Refreshment, and Joy which are to be the rewards of a faithful performance of duty.

The corner-stone does not appear to have been adopted by any of the heathen nations, but to have been as the *eban pinah*, peculiar to the Jews, from whom it descended to the Christians. In the Old Testament, it seems always to have denoted a prince or high personage, and hence the Evangelists constantly use it in reference to Christ, who is called the "chief corner-stone." In Masonic symbolism, it signifies a true Mason, and therefore it is the first character which the Apprentice is made to represent after his initiation has been completed.
