Painting a Better Picture of Ourselves



Some of the "pictures" we present of ourselves as Masons and Eastern Stars are "painted" from the personal and collective behaviors we exhibit to our families, friends and the community as a whole. But in the "big city," unlike the experience of small town living, most of our fellow citizens don't know us personally, much less who is a Mason, an Eastern Star, a Kiwanian and so forth. So, rightly or wrongly, the impression we make on most of the general public is disproportionately controlled by the appearance of our physical home—our Lakewood Masonic Temple.

A casual drive-by, coupled with due attention to traffic, leaves a lingering memory of a large, impressive limestone Greek temple. But in our home city of Lakewood, one of our nation's most walkable cities, we attract the more detailed inspection of pedestrians, who are apt to stop and marvel at such a wonderful, historic structure, and who are left with memories more closely linked to the surface details of our outward appearance.

Last year, largely through the generosity of our donors, we made significant improvements to our outward appearance by installing historically correct windows on the Lodge Room Balcony level of our building and by completing the tuck pointing of the masonry joints on our limestone façade. The unintended consequence of these projects is that the deteriorated condition of the paint on the rest of our windows has become more apparent. Deteriorated paint also exposes the underlying wood and steel window frames to unwanted damage.

We project that it will cost as much as \$17,000 to paint the exterior of the balance of our windows, and this project has become of our two highest priorities along with restoring various areas of interior plaster and decorative painting damaged by past water ingress. Additional funds will be required for these needed interior repairs.

We depend on the continuing loyalty of our members and donors to fund these and other important historical preservation projects. Gifts to the Lakewood Masonic Foundation for these purposes, as well as for our charitable and educational work, are deductible for federal income and estate tax purposes to the extent permitted by law. As the City of Lakewood celebrates its centennial in 2011, we will be celebrating our Lakewood Masonic Temple's 95th birthday. As a celebratory gift, let's join together to restore the wrapping on our historic home, so important to us and to our community, to its original beauty.

Sharing Your Earthly Treasure

Nearly every Mason and Eastern Star who has belonged to one or more groups in our Lakewood Masonic Family has fond memories of his/her experiences. These memories are all the more vivid because of our beautiful Lakewood Masonic Temple, a facility specially designed to provide a home uniquely capable of supporting our fraternal activities.

The unique character of our historic home has inspired many past and present members of our Lakewood Masonic Family to share a portion of their earthly treasure with us as a testimony to their love for our beautiful fraternal home. We hope you are one of our growing list of supporters who have gone beyond their annual dues to make special contributions in support of our Temple.

There are many ways to make donations of your earthly treasure. The most straightforward is to donate to our Annual Fund. Gifts may be made by using the form in our newsletter (see page 11), by responding to our semi-annual letter appeals or by adding a donation to your annual dues. Most gifts are made by check, but we are also able to accept gifts of stocks or other securities which, in many cases, offer additional tax benefits to the donor. And there is still an opportunity this year, for those 70-1/2 years of age or older, to make gifts directly from your IRA to qualified charitable organizations such as our Lakewood Masonic Foundation.

As you grow older, and especially in uncertain times, you may fear that you will run out of money during your lifetime; but you would still like to make a special gift in support of our Lakewood Masonic Temple. Under such circumstances you may feel more comfortable in making a more significant gift through your will, which could be expressed either as a dollar amount or as a percentage of your estate. Similar alternatives are to name us as a beneficiary of a life insurance policy that you no longer need, or to establish a charitable gift annuity or remainder trust.

You may designate your gift or bequest to be used for our historic preservation, educational or charitable purposes; split your gift among these purposes; or simply ask that your gift be devoted to our greatest need.

Your gifts may be directed to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation, to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Endowment Fund or to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Company Operating Fund. Gifts and bequests to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation are deductible for federal estate and income taxes to the extent permitted by law. Gifts to our Endowment and Operating Funds are not deductible, but some donors anticipate that their estates will not benefit from additional charitable deductions or prefer that their gift be preserved in our Endowment Fund principal with only the income used for qualified expenses. As always, we encourage you to consult your legal and financial advisors for assistance in determining in what form and in what amount you should make your gift or bequest.

Master's Message

Brethren:

Squaremen

The Companies of Wrights, Slaters, etc., in Scotland, in the seventeenth century, were called *Squaremen*. They had ceremonies of initiation, and a word, sign, and grip, like the Freemasons. Brother Lyon (*History of the Lodge at Edinburgh*, page 23) says: "The 'Squaremen Word' was given in conclaves of journeyman and apprentices, wrights, slaters, etc., in a ceremony in which the aspirant was blindfolded and otherwise 'prepared'; he was sworn to secrecy, had word, grip, and sign communicated to him, and was afterward invested with a leather apron. The entrance to the apartment, usually a public house, in which the 'brithering' was performed, was guarded, and all who passed had to give the grip. The fees were spent in the entertainment of the Brethren present. Like the Masons, the Squaremen admitted non-operatives."

High Priest's Message

Companions:

Upon reflecting about what to include in this newsletter, I ran across the following poem. I asked myself, "Who first wrote these words?" and "Why leave them in a church to be found?" A little research found that the poem was actually written in 1927 and, about 1959, included in devotional materials compiled by the rector of St. Paul's Church in Baltimore, MD, with a handwritten note "Old St. Paul's Church, Baltimore A. D. 1692" (1692 being the year the church was founded), causing some to wrongly conclude that the poem was written in 1692, a claim widely circulated in the 1960s. Still, the words seem to have a Masonic theme about them. Somehow they sound familiar. So here is that old, somewhat familiar "Desiderata." Read it slowly and think it through. This will add to its meaning.

Go placidly amid the noise & haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence.

As far as possible without surrender be on good terms with all persons. Speak your truth quietly & clearly; and listen to others, even the dull & ignorant; they too have their story. Avoid loud & aggressive persons, they are vexations to the spirit.

If you compare yourself with others, you may become vain & bitter; for always there will be greater & lesser persons than yourself.

Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs; for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals; and everywhere life is full of heroism. Be yourself. Especially, do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity & disenchantment it is perennial as the grass.

Take kindly the counsel of the years, gracefully surrendering the things of youth. Nurture strength of spirit to shield you in sudden misfortune. But do not distress yourself with imaginings. Many fears are born of fatigue & loneliness.

Beyond a wholesome discipline, be gentle with yourself. You are a child of the universe, no less than the trees & the stars; you have a right to be here. And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should.

Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be, and whatever your labors & aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life keep peace with your soul.

With all its sham, drudgery & broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world.

Food For Thought:

Right Worshipful Brother Benjamin Franklin (1/17/1706-4/17/1790 and having served as Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania twice: 1734 and 1739) was what is known as a polymath, from the Greek 'polymathes' meaning "having learned much." We would also say that he was a renaissance man, having embodied the basic tenets of renaissance humanism, which considers humans to be empowered, limitless in their capacities for development and which led to the notion that people should embrace all knowledge and develop their capacities as fully as possible. He was an author, militia colonel, printer, political theorist, politician, postmaster general, publisher, scientist, inventor, satirist, civic activist, statesman, and diplomat. As a scientist, he proved that lightening was electricity, that minerals made good fertilizer, that dark colors attract heat and that the Gulf Stream was warmer than the surrounding waters. He was the first to chart the Gulf Stream. He invented the lightning rod, bifocals, the Franklin stove, an odometer, rocking chair, step-stool, wringer for washing, the mangle for ironing, street lighting and the harmonica. He formed both the first public lending library in America and the first fire department in Pennsylvania. He was a founder of the American Philosophical Society, the Pennsylvania Hospital and the University of Pennsylvania. His name is the only one to have appeared on all five of the documents which established America as a nation: the Declaration of Independence, the Treaty of Amity and Commerce with France, the Treaty of Alliance with France, the Treaty of Peace with England and the United States Constitution.

At the age of 20, Franklin sought to develop his character by a plan of thirteen virtues, and he would work on one of them each week, in round robin fashion, for the rest of his life. Although not yet a Mason at the time, he later learned that Masonic ritual admonishes every Mason to practice these thirteen virtues and they are listed here for your consideration:

"Temperance. Eat not to dullness; drink not to elevation."

"Silence. Speak not but what may benefit others or yourself; avoid trifling conversation."

"Order. Let all your things have their places; let each part of your business have its time."

"Resolution. Resolve to perform what you ought; perform without fail what you resolve."

Molay, Jacques or James De

The twenty-second and last Grand Master of the Templars at the destruction of the Order in the fourteenth century. He was born about the year 1240, at Besançon, in Burgundy, being descended from a noble family. He was received into the Order of Knights Templar in 1265, by Imbert de Peraudo, Preceptor of France, in the Chapel of the Temple at Beaune. He immediately proceeded to Palestine, and greatly distinguished himself in the wars against the infidels, under the Grand Mastership of William de Beaujeu. In 1298, while absent from the Holy Land, he was unanimously elected Grand Master upon the death of Theobald Gaudinius. In 1305, he was summoned to France by Pope Clement V, upon the pretense of a desire, on the part of the Pontiff, to effect a coalition between the Templars and the Hospitalers. He was received by Philip the Fair, the treacherous King of France, with the most distinguished honors, and even selected by him as the godfather of one of his children. In 1307, he repaired, accompanied by three of his knights, to Poitiers, where the Pope was then residing, and as he supposed satisfactorily exculpated the Order from the charges which had been preferred against it. But both Pope and King were guilty of the most infamous deceit. On September 12, 1307, the order was issued for the arrest of the Templars, and De Molay endured an imprisonment for five years and a half, during which period he was subjected to the utmost indignities and sufferings for the purpose of extorting from him a confession of the guilt of his Order. But he was firm and loyal, and on March 11, 1314, he was publicly burnt in front of the Cathedral of Nôtre Dame, in Paris. When about to die, he solemnly affirmed the innocence of the Order, and, it is said, summoned Pope Clement to appear before the judgment-seat of God in forty days and the King of France within a year, and both, it is well known, died within the periods specified (see Transactions, Quatuor Coronati Lodge, volume xx).

Preceptor

Grand Preceptor, or Grand Prior, or Preceptor, or Prior, was the title indifferently given by the Knights Templar to the officer who presided over a province or kingdom, as the Grand Prior or Grand Preceptor of England, who was called in the East the Prior or Preceptor of England. The principal of these Grand Preceptors were those of Jerusalem, Tripolis, and Antioch. —from Mackey's *Revised Encyclopedia of Freemasonry*, 1946.
